The City of Maple Heights has adopted a systematic approach to fund sewer infrastructure improvements that benefit human health and the environment. In 2023/2024 the City secured over \$6,000,000 in outside funding from the Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District, the Ohio EPA, and the Ohio Public Works Commission to help repair our sewers.





These projects address inflow and infiltration (I/I) problems by rehabilitating sewer pipes and manholes, removing direct inflow connections, and repair/replace/line cracked or exfiltrating sanitary and storm sewers. The improvements reduce local sewer flooding and backups that can be attributed to undersized or structurally deficient sewers.









Annual Roadway Repair Program







The City Engineer has worked with the administration to help develop a methodology for selecting the streets to be repaired that eliminates any bias. The following factors are considered when finalizing the list of streets to be resurfaced/repaired under the annual Maple Heights Roadway Repair Program:

- 1.) PAVEMENT CONDITION
- 2.) AVAILABILITY OF GRANT FUNDING
- 3.) EQUITABLE DISTRIBUTION OF ROADWAY CAPITAL FUNDS
- 4.) TOTAL AMOUNT OF LOCAL FUNDS AVAILABLE

The City of Maple Heights will have completed over \$4,000,000 worth of roadway repair work in 2023 and 2024 when combined with the road resurfacing work on other infrastructure projects.



COUNTY ROUTE RECONSTRUCTION PROJECTS

The Administration continuously collaborates with the Cuyahoga Department of Public Works, Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) and the Northeast Ohio Areawide Coordinating Agency (NOACA) to reconstruct and resurface County Routes throughout the City of Maple Heights. The reconstruction work consists of concrete pavement base repairs that will be followed by the installation of an asphalt overlay. The projects also include the replacement of existing curb ramps with new ADA compliant curb ramps.



<u>2023 - Dunham Road:</u> The 1.8 mile section of Dunham Road between Turney Road and Libby Road was reconstructed at a cost of approximately \$2.75 million dollars. Funding included \$588,000 of Ohio Public Works Commission funds ith the balance of cost to be split between the Cuyahoga Department of Public Works (80%) and the City of Maple Heights (20%).

<u>2025 - Rockside Road:</u> The 1.5 mile section of Rockside Road between E.141st Street and the N&S Railroad bridge will be reconstructed at a cost of approximately \$3.2 million dollars. Funding includes \$2.35 million through NOACA with the balance of cost to be split between the Cuyahoga Department of Public Works and the City of Maple Heights.

<u>2026 - Lee Road Bridge:</u> The Cuyahoga Department of Public Works is currently working on plans to reconstruct the Lee Road bridge over Mill Creek located just south of Interstate 480. The project cost will be funded 100% by Cuyahoga County and ODOT.






NOACA RECENTLY ANNOUNCED THE AWARDING OF \$825,000 IN FUNDING FOR THE \$1.5 MILLION SOUTHGATE PARK BOULEVARD RECONSTRUCTION PROJECT. THE PROJECT INVOLVES A STREET RECONSTRUCTION OF SOUTHGATE PARK BOULEVARD WHICH WILL INCLUDE BIKE LANES FROM WARRENSVILLE CENTER ROAD TO NORTHFIELD ROAD. THE BIKE LANES WILL BE CONSTRUCTED WITHIN THE EXISTING PAVEMENT AREA. THE CITY ENGINEER IS CURRENTLY COORDINATING WITH ODOT TO PROGRAM THE PROJECT AND EXPECTS CONSTRUCTION TO START IN LATE 2025 OR EARLY 2026.






